PGDip Physician Associate Studies: New training available in Kent, Surrey and Sussex

We are excited to report that the new PG Diploma courses in Physician Associate Studies (PGDip PAS) launched this year at three universities in our region – Brighton and Sussex Medical School, University of Surrey, and Canterbury Christ Church University in conjunction with the University of Kent.

The PGDip PAS is a two year, full-time course which takes science graduates and trains them to become highly skilled clinicians who go on to work in secondary care or in the community. The training consists of a minimum of 1600 hours of teaching and 1600 hours of clinical practice delivered across different specialisms. These include Acute and General Medicine, Accident and Emergency, Surgery, Obstetrics and Gynaecology, Mental Health, Paediatrics and General Practice.

Fifty students enrolled in April and September 2016 and are all now fully ensconced in their studies.

I had the opportunity to present on the topic of acute geriatrics and spoke about the need for developing services with older people in mind and understanding frailty and how it impacts many older people.



My Visit to AAPA 2016 - Texas

It's an early start to catch my flight from London. I'm spending the next week with my fellow American PA colleagues at the American Academy of Physician Assistants (AAPA) Conference in San Antonio, Texas, and to say I'm excited is an understatement.

As I join my connecting flight from New York to San Antonio I discover I'm sitting next to a PA student from New York. The good thing about the conference is that it allows you to network and I arrange to meet Peter socially later in the week.

Day 1

I walk to the conference centre and once again I am amazed by the number of people walking around, knowing that all of these people are either qualified PAs or students. There are probably more PAs in this conference hall than we have working across the whole of the UK.

I sit down for the first lecture which is on presentations of oral and facial trauma. Another advantage of this conference is that you can participate in lectures that are outside your everyday knowledge base. Some lectures are broken up by quizzes in which you easily participate via your smartphone; the results are displayed on a large screen above the stage which gives a general feel of the knowledge base in the room before and after the lecture.



At a 'general session' we are introduced to a PA called Kevin Lacz who is a former Navy Seal and starred in the film American Sniper alongside Bradley Cooper. For me, Kevin's presentation is

extremely inspiring and highlights what an amazing profession I have joined because he talks about the virtues of being a PA and how the role has many crossovers with being a Navy Seal.

Day 2

Day 2 follows a similar path: more lectures followed by the Challenge Bowl in the evening. This is a competition where PA University Programmes answer medical questions to find out who is the ultimate winner. Lots of music and lots of dancing create a great atmosphere.

Day 3 & 4

Day 3 and 4 are interesting because alongside the usual lectures there is a chance to visit the exhibitors' hall.



This is where hospitals, drug companies, medical technology firms and exam writers come together to showcase their new products in all things healthcare related. It's nice to have a walk around and examine all of the products available. I discover an interesting potential product that I can take home and discuss with other PAs – an app for recording procedures.

Day 5 – final day

After the last of the lectures I feel sad it's all over but have a few extra days to myself to explore Texas. Finally the end of my time in the US has arrived and I prepare to fly back home. Next year's AAPA conference will be in Las Vegas - I am already preparing my trip...
